We present the case of a 32-year-old man with a history of medically intractable seizures since the age of 8. His seizures occur both while sleeping and waking.

Video presentation (symptoms of seizures):

Initially, a symmetrical tonic facial expression resembling a Kabuki actor occurred, which was sometimes accompanied by a slight turning of the neck to the right. The tonic facial expression was immediately followed by tonic posture of the trunk and proximal limbs and was accompanied by vocalization. While his posture was tonic, he extended his left leg and forcefully turned his body to the left. Upon waking, he did not remember the seizures at all. Postictal confusion lasted for several minutes.

Questions and Points of discussion:

Which brain regions can produce these symptoms (symptomatogenic zone)?

Where is an epileptogenic zone?

What kind of treatment should be given?

Data:

We will show data obtained through electroencephalography (EEG), magnetoencephalography (MEG), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), and position emission tomography (PET) after the discussion.
